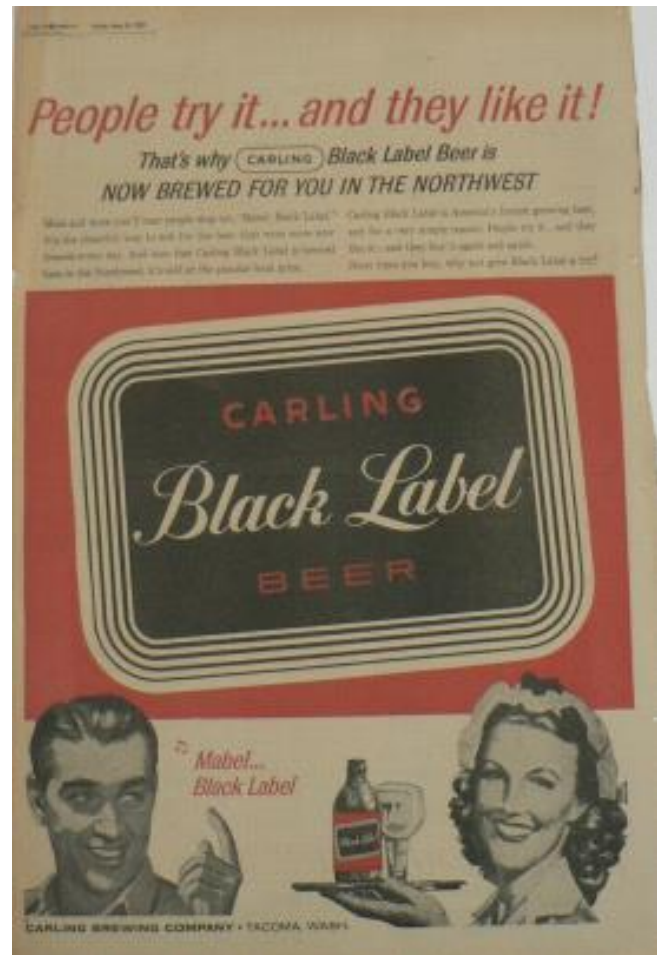

Imperial Beverage Co. of Spokane

The Imperial Beverage Co. was incorporated on December 29, 1915 to conduct a general bottling business in Spokane, Washington. This included the manufacturing and bottling of pure waters, flavored carbonated sodas, mineral waters, ginger ale, sarsaparilla, and other non-alcoholic beverages. Stock was issued to finance the venture. Reinhart Martin, president of the company, was also general manager of the Spokane Brewing and Malting Co. since its inception in 1902. He had been in the brewing business in Germany and United States for 50 years. Robert Sheffels was vice-president and Martin's brother, Fred J. Martin, was manager and secretary-treasurer.

Initially, the company occupied the bottling plant building of the Spokane Brewing and Malting Co. The Galland family, owners of the brewery, had been heavily invested in real estate prior to prohibition and did not really need to operate a brewery to stay alive during the "Great Experiment." Spokane Brewing and Malting Co. half-heartedly brewed their flagship Gilt Top brand as a near-beer as well as various pressed apple products. Sensing prohibition was here to stay and not content doing anything halfway, Martin leased much of the bottling building that was located just across Lincoln St the brewery. There they produced various fruit beverages, syrups, mineral waters, and various flavored carbonated sodas. They also brewed a near-beer called Pilsener Brew, which sold for 5 cents per glass or 10 cents a 6oz bottle, throughout Spokane. By early 1925, Imperial Beverage had outgrown the Broadway St bottling plant and was looking for a new home.

A two miles east of the Spokane Brewing and Malting Co brewery was the Desmet warehouse district. A two-story brick warehouse and factory building at 1107 N Pearl St was constructed in 1925 by Spokane contractor J J Cox for the Pioneer Warehouse Company. The fully insulated 100x140' brick building had two stories and basement with one wing of three stories. The building was constructed at a cost of \$40,000 and was completed July 1st, 1925. Imperial Beverage Co applied for water service to the structure and took a 20-year

lease with the option to buy.

On July 26th, 1925, the Spokane Chronicle reported that, "sixty thousand dollars' worth of new brewing and bottling equipment had been installed at the new plant. Outfitting was expected to be complete in another two weeks, when the company would have an open house day. The company would initially employ 15 people and expected to employ 25 by the next summer. Equipment included a set of \$25,000 automatic bottle washer, filler, crowner, and labeler machine. These machines, connected in series and working together to automatically wash, fill, cap, and label a bottle a second, and can go much faster. One of the machines can handle two bottles a second." The company later installed a Spokane manufactured, 15-ton Armstrong ice machine, to supply refrigeration for the building and a large pasteurizer for the brewery.

The brewery was in the plant's three-story wing. On the top floor was malt storage and the malt mill and mash tun. From the mash tun, wort was gravity fed to the brew kettle and wort chiller, then down to the second story to the fermenters for up to 2 weeks. The fermented beer



was then pumped to the main floor into aging tanks in a room kept at 33 degrees for aging. After aging the beer was dealcoholized, pasteurized and bottled for sale.



The bottling works wing was two stories. The top floor contains several glass-lined mixing tanks, from which the materials are gravity fed to a syrupier on the main floor. Water for brewing and the bottling works was city water that had to be adjusted and cooled in brine pipes before use. Later that first summer the company sunk a 42-foot well in the building. The well water yielded an abundance of water softer than the city water and 10 degrees colder.

After testing by the city chemist, it was determined the water was safe and approved for use in all manufacturing processes.

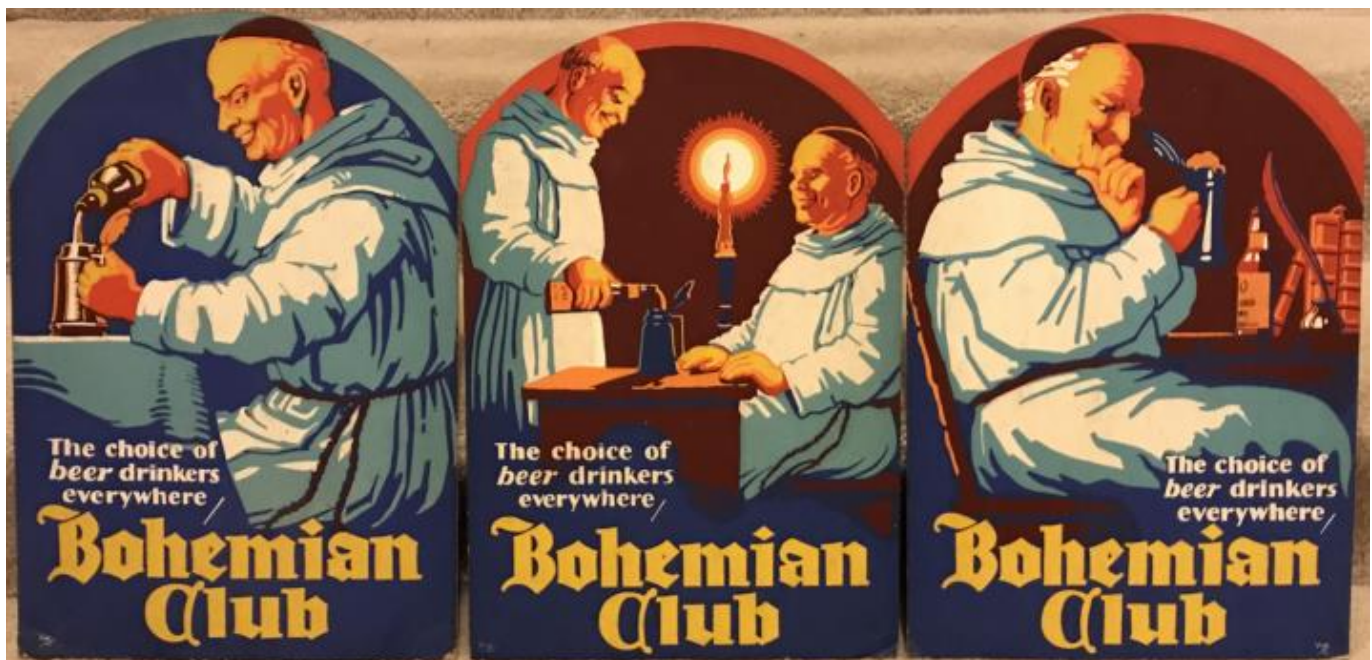
The brewery produced up to 65 barrels of beer in an eight-hour day and the bottling works 1000 cases of various drinks. The company was the exclusive Spokane bottlers of Coca Cola, Hire's Root Beer, Whistle, Muscadine Punch and Green River brands. They also produced their own high-quality Imperial Ginger Ale that was "warranted to keep in any climate."

As lucrative as being the exclusive Spokane bottlers of Coca Cola and Hire's root beer must have been, the '29 crash and crippling depression that followed took its toll. By November of

1932, Imperial Beverage Co was in receivership. W. R. Orndorff was appointed by the creditors to liquidate the assets of the company, though the company did continue to produce their contracted soft drink lines under direction of R. W. Donnelly.

Corona

It wasn't that long ago that if someone said Corona, the first thought was a cold Mexican beer with a lime in it. Maybe one of the many commercials, set on the beach, with a couple sitting on deck chairs with bottles of Corona between them. This article features Corona beer cans from Mexico, Bolivia, Puerto Rico, and New York.

Corona is the flagship brand of Mexico's Modelo brewery that goes back nearly 100 years. Modelo was ultimately purchased by Anheuser-Busch InBev. It is one of the top five beers in the world, and the top selling imported beer in the USA. But, the US Corona's are not made by Model-AB-InBev. For anti-trust reasons, the US sales are controlled by Constellation Brands who brew it at another brewery in Mexico. Constellation is famous for spending a billion dollars to buy San Diego craft brewery Ballast Point, and then recently unloading it for a small fraction of that amount. They are also famous for spending over four billion dollars for a large stake in a Canadian cannabis company. Between keeping Americans buzzed on light beer, and Canadians high on pot, this is clearly an essential company. The can below is a tab top from the 1960's.

Corona Ducal was produced by the National Brewery of Bolivia. The brewery traces back to the 1870's and is still being produced today. The cans below date from the 1970's.



The next set of cans are the Coronas from Puerto Rico. It has a typical beer slogan "el sabor lo dice todo" - "the taste says it all". The Corona Malta cans are even bolder with "Nutritious and Refreshing" and "8 vitamins and minerals". The low-alcohol beers, like these malta's, have always billed themselves as a nutritious beverage.



Lastly, there is the Corona from New York City. There is no doubt that it is emulating the Puerto Rican version of Corona. This was targeted towards the large population of Puerto Rican immigrants living in New York City. It was produced by Five Star, which is famous for its unusual 10-ounce Five Star beer can from the 1950's. The only other Five Star beer can I have, is the gold Tudor can with the castle turrets on the label. None of these three are common.

Picker Finds Unexpected Gold in Oregon City Score

An [eBay picker](#) from Portland spotted a Gambrinus Beer bottle in an antique store for a good price. The dealer said he also had a beer can collection and would they be interested. He hit the BCCA Facebook page to check interested in the find – and there was plenty. From their eBay starting price strategy, it was clear they did not know anything about beer collectibles.



Jeff Berry scored this unusual 1930s Alt Heidelberg bottle at a garage sale. He also added this Horluck's Vienna via eBay to his growing half gallon bottle collection.



The Gambrinus (gem of the collection?) started at \$325 and languished for months before being pulled after not selling for \$99. Some common cans started for way too much too, but they were surprised and well rewarded with others. The highest price I saw was \$650 for the Argonaut. Other notables: Excell: \$234, Dunkel Brau: \$305, and SPUR: \$190. They made out nicely on their antique store find. This is the type of find which might walk into a local beer show during a normal year.
