Chapter corner

My Column this issue will be devoted to some of the most asked questions or comments which appeared on the chapter renewal forms. To those of you that complimented us, thank you, it is nice to know that our work is appreciated.

The single most commented on subject really does not deal with chapters, but since it was asked I will do my best to answer. It has been asked why we serve chicken at the Convention Banquet so often and secondly, if we serve chicken, why is the banquet cost so high. In response, let me attempt to make you the Convention Planner. Imagine, if you will, that you must plan a sit down dinner for 1,000 people where all people are served at approximately the same time, knowing that your main objective is to keep the cost at a minimum. Obviously, you immediately rule out prime rib, sirloin, etc. because of cost, secondly you must please the majority so you rule out exotic foods such as lobster, duck and the like. Finally, you are faced with but a few choices and the most obvious and most reasonable is chicken.

Now that the main dish is selected, you build around it, remembering that every item you add increases the cost. Finally, the entire meal is planned and you're done right? Wrong. Now you must consider all the "little" things which are built into the cost of a banquet but most of which aren't considered by those attending. Tables, chairs, table cloths, napkins must be rented and set up, security provided, waiters and waitresses hired, clean up personnel, the list goes on and on. The point is, whether or not you prefer something other than chicken

(and I personally do) the banquet must be planned for the majority at the lowest possible cost to the membership.

The next point most commented on is Associate Members. An Associate Member is a non-BCCA member who can be a chapter member for up to one year or until chapter dues are due, subject to a maximum of one year. An associate cannot hold a chapter office and is not eligible to vote on chapter or BCCA matters.

Lastly, there were a few comments on supplies and their availability to the chapters, especially smaller chapters. A year or so ago we offered chapter supply kits to all chapters at a reduced price. The supplies were for chapter resale so that they could enjoy a profit. Of 102 active chapters at that time, 2 chapters availed themselves and after some time much of these 2 kits were returned for rebate. The idea was, for obvious reasons, discontinued. Can totes are available to chapters for \$4.00 apiece plus postage, minimum order 30. If you are in the St. Louis area and can pick them up at the office, you'll save postage.

As of this writing 52 of 104 active chapters have returned their chapter renewal forms. Please if you haven't returned yours, do so now. It saves headaches later.

Only listing this time is for the Genesee Valley Chapter. Plan to attend their August "Mini-Can-Can". For more information contact Rick Hoppe #754.

ALSTADT ALT/Becker/St. Ingbert, W. Germany. Don't litter logo "mach mit" has been added to this 0,331 blue can (See July-Aug., '80, #1).

BARCLAYS EXPORT SPARKLING BEER/Courage Ltd./U.K.). 330ml, two faced blue and white striped can with the exact same label design as the 34 cls. flat top. This label is new in this can size, is two piece, and has wording changes on the can side.

1. **BECKER'S PILS/Becker/St. Ingbert-Saar, Germany.** 1.) Still a silver 0,331 can but note the addition of an "s" to the brand name; Becker's — formerly Becker. "Das frische Pils" (in script) appears on this can as it did on the 4.0L can reported on 7/'81. 2.) Twelve

can "ERSTE SERIE" of train engines for you scene/series buffs. **Top Row** (left to right) ERBAUT: 1868, ERBAUT: 1893, ERBAUT: 1903. **Middle Row** (left to right) ERBAUT: 1913, ERBAUT: 1920, ERBAUT: 1921, ERBAUT: 1940. **Bottom Row** (left to right) ERBAUT: 1941 45 (DR), ERBAUT: 1941 50 (DR), ERBAUT: 1950, ERBAUT: 1955, ERBAUT: 1957.

2. **BERLINER KINDL PILS/Berliner Kindl/Berlin, W. Germany.** Another change to this 0,331 white can whereby the red seal is now above the brand name. Within the seal is a young boy in a blue stein with "Seit 1872" on the stein.

BROCK LAGER 1777/Hall & Woodhouse/Blandford Dorset, England. 440ml brand new design; all green with a white center which contains a crest (green and cream colored) and the brand name (in red and green).

BUDWEISER BIERE•BEER/Labatt/Montreal, Quebec, Canada. Two different aluminum cans have been issued. I've received mail that one aluminum can has King of Beers (like the straight/steel can), with some wording changes being made to the second 341ml aluminum can. Words Bier•Beer in place of King of Beer — Brasse selon la recette originale — Brewed by the original process (on both can faces) — PAR LA

BRASSERIE LABATT LTEE, MONTREAL QUEBEC (on one can face) and BY LABRASSERIE LABATT LTEE, MONTREAL QUEBEC (on the other). Being issued in Quebec province these cans have the ecology logo on one can side.

CARLSBERG BEER/Carlsberg/Copenhagen•Denmark Special, 330ml all blue two faced can; gold oval with Italian wording, and the words Beer de Luxe at the bottom, for the Italian market. Some general (and sad) information. Denmark has stopped issuing beer in cans as of the end of 1981 for local use. However beer cans for export are still being produced. The big can company in Denmark, HAUSTRUPS FACTORIES, has moved all production to the head company, PLM, in Sweden. Denmark has the re-use bottle system, which has to be protected, hence the agreement between the government and the breweries of no local beer cans for use within the country.

CHARLES WELLS FARGO TRADITIONAL STRONG BITTER/Charles Wells/Bedford, England. Some stagecoach design and colors (black and cream) but now available in the 440ml size. ORIGINAL GRAVITY 1043°-1047°.

CO OP EXPORT ALE/CO OP LAGER/Co-Operative Whsle. Society Ltd./Manchester, (England). These cans still have the same label but the contents are now shown as 440ml 15.5 fl. oz. on the can faces whereas they were reversed when featured in the Sept.-Oct., 1978 column. Export Ale is still a red can and Lager is still a green can.

COURAGE NO. 1 BEER/Courage/England. Has become a two faced 33cl. can with the words Biere Bier Cerveza Birra at the bottom. The word BEER now appears within the shield below No. 1, and "A Sparkling Beer" no longer appears at the top of this can. New two piece can with wording changes on the can sides as well.

3. **CRUSADER DARK LAGER BEER**/Bass Limited/Burton-on-Trent, U.K. Metallic gray 440ml can with a sword, shield, and banner in red, white, blue and gold. "A Full bodied darker lager, specially brewed by Bass, with a refreshing but mellow flavour that sets it apart from other lagers."

DORTMUNDER RITTER FIRST/Dortmunder Ritter/Dortmund, Germany. 5.0L gold barrel can having a large rectangular white label with lettering in black, red, and gold which is trimmed in black. A "first" for the foreign composite too.

4. **DRYBROUGHS BEST SCOTCH ALE/ DRYBROUGHS EXPORT**/Drybrough & Co. Ltd./Edinburgh, Scotland. First one is a new brand and the second is a changed label on these 440ml cans. The BEST SCOTCH ALE is purple with green and white contrast colors, whereas the EXPORT is still a red can with blue and white contrast colors, but the man is now in front of the "X" and at the bottom of the can.

5. **EICHBAUM EXPORT ALTGOLD/EICHBAUM PILSENER**/Eichbaum/Mannheim, Germany. EXPORT can is an 0,33 liter all green can with a cream colored label design as the focal point. The words Eichbaum Export Altgold (in gold) printed all over the can. The PILSENER can is an 0,331 silver can, having a white label type design in the center of the can. The words

Eichbaum Pilsener (in green) printed all over the can. Both cans have the usual encircled tree logo plus coins.

EKU KULMBACHER PILS/Eku/(Germany). Available in 4 and 5 liters (shipped from Argentina) with two lines of Spanish above the word Kulmbacher. The 4 liter has a silver band 1/4" above the white at the bottom, whereas the 5 liter has two silver bands at the top and bottom.

EX BIER/Gurten/Wabern, Bern, Switzerland. Issued in a 33 CL. all white aluminum can, having the same label as the 33 CL. crimp steel can. There is now a white band at the top and bottom and what was gold on the crimp steel can is now a beige color on this aluminum can.

GUINNESS EXTRA STOUT/Arthur Guinness/London, (England). New in 1981, 440ml all black with beige oval aluminum promo can "SAVE THE TOUCAN." This is the London version with that city name appearing on both can faces at the bottom. Also available in the 275ml crimp steel size (no wording at the bottom of the can) but it is on the non-seam side of the can-LONDON VERSION.

GUINNESS FOREIGN EXTRA STOUT/Arthur Guinness/Dublin, Ireland. Brewed in Ireland by Arthur Guinness & Son & Co., on the can side; canned by Guinness Export Ltd. Liverpool, England on the can faces of this new design all black with cream colored oval 33 Centilitres aluminum can.

6. **HAAKE BECK PILS**/Haake Beck/Bremen, (Germany). Accent colors of red, green, gold and black

highlight the white oval of this gold, 33 cl. can.

HARP LAGER/Harp/London, (England). Two 4 pint cans have been issued to date; 1.) address in bottom part of the oval which is now obsolete. 2.) contents in bottom part of the oval which is the current can. This is the usual blue can with yellow and white accent colors.

HOFMEISTER LAGER/Courage/London, U.K. "Over 10% extra FREE" at the top (in a red band) on this 485ml can (issued for an eight week period). Usual cream colored can with the bear chained to the tree.

IND COOPE DIAMOND HEAVY ALE/Ind Coope/Alloa, Scotland. Alertness of the eye must prevail to discern the change on the face of this 440ml all black can with large D. in burgundy. New style letters for IND COOPE HEAVY ALE appear in the gold oval. In addition the UPC has been added and the brewery is now Ind Coope in Alloa, Scotland (on can side) whereas it was formerly Allied Burton-On-Trent (on can side) when originally featured May-June '77, #4.

JOHN COURAGE STRONG PALE ALE/ Courage/London, (England). The Courage Group is giving away free beer in this major promotion of the 485ml cans. Courage had to alter their canning line to cope with the taller cans, but will revert back to the normal 440ml cans. Usual black portrait can, with the words "Over 10% extra FREE" in a red band at the top.

JUPLIER/Dalla/Belgium. The words MALZ LAGER BIER (on one can face) and BIERE BIER BEER (on the other can face) at the bottom of this 0,33L all red can.

The number "5" has been deleted and Brewed and Canned In Belgium is now at the top and SERVIR FRAIS•KOEL SCHENKEN at the bottom of the white oval, on both can faces.

7. **KARLSBERG EXPORT/Karlsberg/Homburg Saar, (Germany).** White, blue, tomatoe red and gold, two sided 0,33l can with the words Ein Bier von Welt near the bottom.

8. **KARLSKRONE ALT/Karlsberg/Homburg Saar, (Germany).** Gold crown atop a gold oval is the design of this all white 0,33l can having three labels. However between the center and right label is the brewery seal and this is the label shown.

KARLSQUELL EDEL-PILS/(Germany). Imported by ALDI-INKOOP of Culemborg, Holland. This is the white and blue 0,33l can with the BRAUWASSER GARANTIE logo (on the non-seam can side), and three glasses of beer (that touch) on the back, but the words Bier Biere Beer Birra have been added above the beer glasses and of course the importers name, etc, is on the can.

9. **M/B-Metal Box** The British Can Maker. Something for every collector; being a prototype of can being used by breweries around the world. Three sided half pint can. (Can face shown only).

10. **MULLERBRAU BADENER GOLD/** Muller/Baden, (Germany). Beautiful all gold 3,3 dl can with the oval containing the drawing of historic Baden.

PATRIZIER EDELHELL EXPORT/Patrizier/Nurnberg, Germany. Only change I can note on this 0,33l can is there is now a wide bronze band at the top and bottom whereas there used to be a red, bronze, and two white bands at the top and bottom. (See Sept.-Oct., '80, #14).

PATRIZIER PILS/Patrizier/Nurnberg, W. Germany. Similar to Edelhell Export (Sept.-Oct., '80, #14) but the inner oval ring is green (instead of orange) and there is a green line (instead of red) at the top and bottom of this 33 cl can.

PAULANER PILS/Paulaner-Salvator-Thomasbrau/ Munich, Germany. This 33 CL can is now all silver with Paulaner (in silver) Pils (in black trimmed in copper), and copper coins. There is wording in script on each side of Pils, plus words below the logo, also in script. The word MUNCHEN has been eliminated from the label.

11. **PAULANOR URTYP 1634/Paulaner-Salvator-Thomas/Munich, Germany.** 0,33 Liter gold all aluminum can with white center and red and blue accent colors.

12. **PICKUP LAGER/(South Africa).** "We're Pretty Sure You've Never Been Asked To Test Ride A Thoroughbred Like This Before" per the brochure from a VW dealer in Durban. Very bright (340ml) red and yellow can featuring a Volkswagen pickup with English on one side and Afrikanese on the other. (Both sides shown).

PRIPPS EXPORT STARKOL III/Pripps/(Sweden). Reminiscent of Pripps Export Starkol III-45cl but with some differences on this 33 dml aluminum two sided can. Still all blue with gold bands at the top and bottom, but the five gold coins flank and now touch the five sided Pripp logo at the top.

RESCH PILSENER SPECIAL EXPORT/Tooth/Lismore, Melbourne, Sydney, Australia. Silver can with horse's head now with the contents as 750 ml.

RUDDLES BITTER TRADITIONAL BEER/G. Ruddle/Langham, Oakham, Rutland, U.K. Usual table scene on this 440ml can with the **bright** blue oval and enlarged brand name, plus "Specially Canned For Travelers Fare" at the bottom on the non-seam can side.

SABRE LAGER/Everards/Burton-On-Trent, (England). Label design remains the same on this 440ml aluminum can but with color changes; the most obvious being the headdress which is now gray. (See May-June '79, #14 crimp steel can).

13. SAINSBURY'S YORKSHIRE BITTER/for J. Sainsbury/Tadcaster Yorks, England. Colorful (red, yellow, green, white and black) 440ml aluminum can featuring a horse drawn wagon.

14. SCHLOSS-PRIVAT PILSENER/Schloss/Neunkirchen, W. Germany. Ornate gold crest, flanked by gold coins are the focal point of the white rectangle label on this all silver 0,331 can.

15. SCHOONER BEER•BIERE/Oland/Halifax Saint John, Canada. Label design of this 341ml straight steel can has been changed to match the bottles which were changed early last summer. Still an all white can, with blue oval which contains the sailing vessel, but the word **OLAND** now appears directly above said vessel within a rectangle.

SCHULTHEISS EXPORT/Schultheiss/Berlin, Germany. Second change has been made to the label of this 0,33 LITER extruded steel can. It's still an all brown can but the man is now in brown and white with two medals to his right at the top of the parchment of this two sided can. The brewery name and city location is at the bottom of the can.

SENATOR URBOCK MAIBOCK/Holsten/Hamburg, Germany. Senator (in black and gold), Urbock (in white) on a green oval trimmed in gold, plus a green line at the top and bottom of this white 33cl can.

SOBERANA EXTRA FINA/Nacional/Panama. 296 CC can, being identical to the 355 CC can featured July-Aug., '79, #23. Still white with green and gold accent colors — aluminum can. Soberana means Freedom.

16. ST. MICHAEL PILSENER LAGER/ST. MICHAEL PREMIUM PALE ALE/For Marks and Spencer/London, U.K. Pilsner Lager is a silver can and the Premium Pale Ale is a red can. Both are 440ml new issues.

STRONGARM STRONG NORTHERN ALE/J. W. Cameron/Hartlepool, U.K. A second version, of this can occurred in 1981. 440ml dark chocolate brown color; two piece; vertical computer bars and the brewery name and location now appears on **both** can faces, at the bottom. (See 9, '81, #20).

SUNTORY REAL DRAFT/Suntory/(Japan). I'm told these cans are only sold in Japan. 350 ml can; Golfer in ten positions in silver and white with a silver band at the bottom. Red #3204, Green #3214. (Same basic design as featured March-April 1981, #15-right).

TOOTH KB LAGER/Tooth/Lismore, Melbourne, Sydney, Australia. Usual gold pebble can with horse's

head at top now with the contents as 750ml.

17. WEIGAND BIER/Karlsberg/Homburg, Germany. For a building supply company "Everything For The House." Hardware, Tools, Heating, Plumbing, Concrete. An Inhalt 0,331 green can with each of the three faces being different. I'm told this is a tough can to acquire per my source's contact at the brewery. (Front shown only).

18. WEST END EXPORT BEER/South Australian/Adelaide, Australia. TAA AIRBUS. Now on interstate Australia services you can enjoy international standard comfort. Exclusive to TAA widebodied Airbus. Airbus provides wide twin aisles, with no passenger more than one seat from an aisle, extra overhead locker space and on-flight entertainment right at your seat. -375ml. (Both sides shown).

19. WHITBREAD PALE ALE/Whitbread/London, England. Brand new design on this all blue 330ml can (but the animal logo reminds me of my Whitbread Lager "dumper" can from South Africa) with the words **BEER•CERVEZA** on the face (shown) and **ALE•BIERE** on the other at the bottom.

WURZBURGER HOFBRAU PILS/Wurzbürger/Wurzburg, W. Germany. Now a gold Inhalt 0,331 can, sans glass of beer on the can side. The star and circle at the top is now trimmed in gold, plus there is three lines of print on each side of said encircled star.

YOUNGER'S KESTREL EXPORT LAGER/Scottish & Newcastle/Edinburgh, Scotland. Mate to the Pilsner Lager featured in Jan.-Feb., 1980, #24. Still all green, but 330ml in size and the word **EXPORT** in place of **PILSENER**, and no line of print at the bottom of this aluminum can.

Down in the dumps

I've just finished reading my last *News Report* and I can see that I missed out on another great Convention. Due to conflicts with school and especially money, I've never had the opportunity to go to one. So I guess all of you are just going to have to wonder about me.

I've got a little news tidbit that may be of interest to you. Recently, Massachusetts passed their version of the bottle bill, joining Connecticut, Maine, and Vermont. I think it's a shame every state doesn't have it yet, because, believe me, it sure does help out with litter and all. It starts in Mass. in 1983, so pretty soon you'll have a nice little stamp on all the cans from that state, too.

Once again, I've got some great tips from some great people:

Justin Smith #20669 saw some great cans at the bottom of a river near his home. It could be hard to

get at those treasures, but it may be worth your time to check out river beds and try to get at them. Just be sure to proceed with caution.

Steve Tracy #21248 reminds me to always carry a stick when you are searching. Steve has one made of a broom handle, with a bicycle grip squeezed on at one end, and whittled down at the other to reach inside cans.

Dave Pacela #23113 tells me to remember to take personal items along, especially if you are searching in the desert, such as water (or any other cool beverage), sunglasses, hat, and boots. Also, keep your eyes open for abandoned mines or houses — just be careful around them!

I got these tips from the Goebel Gang Chapter newsletter: Testor's paints work very well for repainting or touching-up cans, and they are very inexpensive. Just be sure to match the color correctly, and keep in mind that paints will look darker when they dry. Be sure to buy quality paint brushes, and get several sizes. You can try to patch holes with Liquid Aluminum, or even with Elmer's Glue if the hole is small. Be sure to try this with several thin layers and not one thick gloppy one. Of course, the repatched hole will probably have to be repainted as well.

Ron Martin #17281: Now here's one I can attest to. Be very careful

when putting dumpers into Can Totes. Those slots are very narrow, and you can ruin a good can if you try to force those cans in there. By the way, the slots on the sides are a bit wider than the ones in the middle, so maybe you can put your prize dumpers there.

Jim Javenkoski #18397 has had good results with lemon juice, just as I've had. He suggests mixing five cups of water with $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of lemon juice, plus a dash of salt. The cans can soak for a long time with no damage to the paint.

Jim Whiteside #21553 suggests using muriatic acid to clean cans. This stuff is used by plumbers to clean rust from pipes and stuff, so you can imagine that it's very strong. Use a plastic container to soak the cans in, because this stuff reacts with metal as well. Don't leave the can in for more than 2-3 minutes, and wash it off with water afterwards to neutralize the acid. Has anyone else used this stuff before? I'd like to know more about it.

I'm running out of letters to look at, so I really wish I could hear from some of you. What have you come up with this fall?

Can anyone help me get some mild weather over my Christmas vacation?

The Elusive American Cone

The American Can Company produced cone top beer cans with their famous "KEGLINED" trademark in the late 1930s and early 1940s. To my knowledge these cans were used by only five different breweries: American Brewing Co., Rochester, NY; Gunther Brewing Co., Baltimore, MD; and Esslinger's, Inc., Jacob Hornung Brewing Co., and C. Schmidt & Sons, Inc., all of Philadelphia, PA.

"American" 12 ounce cones are somewhat different from those of the other can companies. They are slightly shorter than the regular (later) Continental or Crown can, have a flat bottom and distinctive crimp marks on the neck of the spout. Of course these cans also have the famous "KEGLINED" panel found along the seam. I have noted three variations of the "KEGLINED" panel on cones: full length by 3/8" wide with "Trade Mark Am. Can Co." and patent information to each side of "KEGLINED;" full length by 3/4" wide with all info under "KEGLINED" and 1 1/2" by 5/8" with all info under the "KEGLINED."

The small number of breweries and somewhat limited years of production of these cans combine to make most of them rather scarce. The Gunther brand was virtually unknown to the majority of collectors until the last year. I certainly never knew of its existence until I received two different varieties in the mail one day from Ray Knisley #877. One of the two closely resembles an early punch top variety (BCU 78-7). The other one is quite similar but is dark brown with a much larger yellow area in the center background. Both Gunthers are pre-1940 cans as evidenced by only two patent numbers, Others Pending, on the "KEGLINED" panel.

Another interesting "American" cone is the Esslinger's Ale 23-18. This can, copyrighted 1938, has recipes for Welsh Rabbit, Cole Slaw and Ale Flip on the back. All recipes call for healthy portions of "Little Man" ale of course. This can and the Schmidt's 34-21 are probably the most often seen by collectors, whereas the Gunthers, Hornung, other Esslinger's and several Tamo' Shanters are rare even in dumpsters. The following list is a composite by brewery of those American cones with which I am familiar. BCU number is listed first followed by Martel's Cone Top Bible no. where they exist. A (2) after the brand name

dates a can as pre - 1940 because only two patent numbers are present and a (3) denotes a post - 1940 can having three patent numbers.

In addition to Ray Knisley, I would like to thank Dick Adamowicz #344 and Dave Launt #11325 for helping me put this list together and, more importantly, helping me obtain many of the cans listed.

If you know of any 12 ounce cones by American Can Co. that I missed, or can furnish additional information, please write me and I will update the composite list in a future News Report. American also produced quart cones but I don't have enough information to include them in this article. One of you more advanced quart cone collectors out there will have to tackle that one. How about it, Dave?

On my scale of 1 (malt duck, Black Label) to 10 (Hudy & Old Cloudy), I give it an 11. The only problem is that it's not available in cans. There are rumors that it soon will be, but Hudepohl officials won't commit themselves one way or another.

On our first trip, every retail outlet was completely sold out, but we did manage to find it on draft at a bar 3 blocks from the brewery. The bar, NORBY'S, is owned and operated by EMMETT SWARTS, a retired Hudepohl Executive. We also took a tour of the Brewery. The tour took about 90 minutes, and I've never been on a brewery tour like it. Janet and I were the only ones on the tour, and the guide took us to every nook and cranny of the brewery. It was topped off by a stop at the new GIFT HAUS and a visit to the BIERSTUBE, which leads me into the second BEER OF THE ISSUE: Hudy's HOFBRAU. It's not quite as good as MOERLEIN, but it's a tad better than HUDY; gotta give it a 10½. HOFBRAU will be available in all of Hudy's markets, but MOERLEIN will be sold in Cincinnati ONLY. If you're ever close to Cincinnati, just take the Freeman Ave. exit off I-75, go to the brewery and ask for Dick Nichols, Hudy's Director of Special Events. He's a fine gentleman, and he will go out of his way to show you the brewery, and see that your visit is well worth your time.

Gotta thank LOUIS DURBIN, #859, for giving us shelter for the night, and seeing that we were never without a cold beer.

Aaron also received his first beer can. Alan Diederich, #7984 brought him a National Bohemian Quart Cone. Aaron's collection now consists of one can, and he has one more quart cone than his Dad. Ron & Cooke Macdonald are at it again. They sent Lisa a box of root beer cans they accumulated during the Convention.

Plans Taking Shape for Convention XII

While some of us are still savoring CANvention XI in Chicago, some are already gearing for Minneapolis next September 16-18 and that is basically what is included in the report that follows.

On a recent visit to Minneapolis, we began to finalize the plans for the CANvention. The Leamington Hotel with 525 rooms has been chosen for the headquarters and the Curtis Hotel across the street has an additional 400 rooms blocked for us. The Curtis has both an indoor and outdoor pool, while at the Leamington you'll have to be satisfied splashing in your bathtub. Be sure to take the beer out first though.

It is highly probable that the current room rates will go down as the result of our meeting. At the same time, an increase across the board for all items on the menu is anticipated. So, I cannot quote you any firm prices at this time.

We have forgone the use of the convention center for a number of reasons. Based on last year's attendance, we believe the hotels have adequate facilities, although it may be somewhat crowded. It will save us from having to lug our totes a couple of blocks, not to mention a good size savings on our registration fees.

Another deciding factor against the use of the convention center is that their contract will contain a penalty clause whereby each item affixed to their walls will carry a \$500 fine up to a maximum of \$5000. This would be virtually impossible to monitor and would only be throwing our money away. The hotels indicated a concern also and will place bulletin boards throughout. I encourage you to use them rather than placing your information on walls and the like. I'm sure in the future, more places may be imposing such fines, so we may as well start controlling it now.

There are some drawbacks in having the functions at the hotels, in that the Leamington has only about 32,000 square feet for the general trade session and will encompass three floors. There will be limited tables available and will be on a first come, first served basis. Those not taking a trade table will get a reduced cost on the registration fee.

There are only four elevators in the Leamington, so I suggest we all cut back a little on our trading stock. Ice will be no problem. What the hotel cannot furnish, we will get from an outside source and be distributed throughout the hotels.

In all, plans for CANvention XII are progressing nicely. Jack Isacson and the North Star Chapter members will see to it that this will be one of the best.

Rhinelanders: No. 1 with Huber

"Refreshing as Wisconsin's Northwoods."

That slogan is familiar to beer connoisseurs throughout the Midwest as the trademark of Rhinelanders Beer.

Only today, the beer is made by the Joseph Huber Brewing Co. in Monroe, more than 200 miles south of Rhinelanders and the area traditionally known as the Northwoods.

Through imaginative marketing and good promotion, Huber has made Rhinelanders Beer the best selling of its beers and kept it a household name in taverns from Ohio to Minnesota.

"We bought quite a few labels, but I think the Rhinelanders label has been the most advantageous," says Don Hugdahl, general sales manager for Huber. "We put a lot of effort in the label because we knew it would sell."

Huber purchased the rights to Rhinelanders Beer in 1967 after the old Rhinelanders Brewery was placed in receivership. It was just one of the hundreds of small breweries which closed during the 1960s and 1970s as large conglomerate brewers took over the majority of the market.

When Huber took over the Rhinelanders label, the company "put it on ice" for a few years, repackaged it and changed the once expensive brand into an "economically priced" one.

It quickly took hold and caught the hearts of suds slingers in such beer drinking cities as Chicago, Minneapolis and even Milwaukee. Huber was the top label until 1970 when it was surpassed by Rhinelanders.

"That's when Rhinelanders really caught on," says Hugdahl.

By 1975, Rhinelanders made up about seven percent of the brewery's output. In 1980, the company brewed 294,000 barrels of beer. Thirty percent was sold under the Rhinelanders label.

"Rhinelanders is a beery name," explains Hugdahl of its wide appeal. "It's a good beer at a good price."

Huber bottles or cans 14 different labels, yet, the Rhinelanders label has been the main growth brand — although its Augsburgers label which is intended to compete with such beers as Heileman's Special Export, Anheuser's Michelob and Pabst's Andecker, is also gaining notoriety.

Hugdahl says Rhinelanders is the "number one economy priced label" in both Milwaukee and Chicago. It is also distributed in Ohio, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota.

Otto Dietz, former brewmaster for the Rhinelanders Brewery, explains that Rhinelanders Beer was a big seller in the Milwaukee and Chicago markets when it was brewed in Rhinelanders.

"Name recognition helps when Chicago people come north," says Dietz, who is still a devoted Rhinelanders fan.

"I always buy it," says the former brewmaster. "They're producing a good product."

Huber has stayed in business when other small breweries have failed, says Hugdahl, because of its location. Within a 150-mile radius of the plant 15 million people reside. The product is good, too!

"Every small brewery is making a better product at a better price than the major breweries," argues Hugdahl.

Huber employs 102 workers and has a 450,000-barrel-a-year capacity. Hugdahl thinks the trend of small breweries being bought out by large breweries is subsiding, and says the ones that are left should do well.

"We think our future is fantastic," he says optimistically.

Rhinelanders Brewing Company was established in 1892 by Henry Danner and Otto A. Hilgermann who came from Minneapolis. The two, who owned a furniture factory that specialized in bar furnishings, opened the plant which then had a capacity of 30,000 barrels a year.

The firm closed in 1919 for Prohibition and most of its equipment was shipped to Mexico. Prohibition ended Dec. 5, 1933, and by Dec. 23 the brewery had beer on sale. Brewing operations had resumed in September.

In 1940 the company introduced its "Shorty" seven-ounce bottle, which became an instant hit.

By 1960 the company had a capacity of 40,000 barrels a year, employed 30 persons, and had 51 distributorships in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois.

It all ended in June 1967 when the company drained the last 291 barrels because it could not afford even the \$10-per-barrel tax on the product.

Rhinelanders Beer is still one of the most popular off-sale beers in the Northwoods — particularly in the town which gave it its name.

Which goes to prove you can take the beer out of the Northwoods, but you can't take the Northwoods out of the beer.

Book review

"Over the past decade beer can collecting has experienced a swift incline and then a small decline. During the decline the less serious collectors dwindled and now the serious collectors remain. CANTique believes the future of beer can collecting is as bright as ever."

After the Convention in Chicago it is quite tough to quarrel with such optimism. As announced a while back the editors of the standard beer can reference *Beer Cans Unlimited* have promised supplements to their book and this volume is the first of these to appear.

The format consists of cans listed by number according to their respective page numbers and can numbers in the two previous editions (same numbers used in both editions). Next to these can numbers is what the editors believe to be a realistic market price of the cans. For those collectors who find disagreement with quoted figures there is an invitation to respond to the editors for consideration, and one expects future revisions to include some of this input.

As there are no illustrations of cans, readers will need access to a copy of either edition of BCU to identify the cans from the numbers. By having a copy of the original BCU and this revision a collector should be able to evaluate his own collection and maybe even consider some thoughts on future BCCA policies.

History of the Carson Brewing Company

Somehow I thought that . . . uh . . . something else was Nevada's oldest business as it is everywhere else, but this brewery did stand firm by its claim. Here is probably the only definitive story of the complete existence of one small American brewery, the Carson Brewing Company of Carson City, Nevada.

In these pages are all the reasons for us to buy our beer from the small companies; not only do they offer some fine brews, but also some special local history as well. With the Carson Brewing Company the story begins with their establishment in 1860 through their years producing such beverages as steam beer, bock beer, near beer, soft drinks, and lager beer and ends with that sad day of March 31, 1948 when they produced no beer at all. Operation of the brewery was affected by events including wars, Prohibition, the Great Depression, government regulation, and even post-war prosperity. All are discussed and illustrated by dozens of photographs.

These illustrations show a great deal of the items used in the brewing (some even purchased from the Grace Bros. Brewing Co.) and those for promotion of their products. The photos are accompanied by lots of colorful stories about these things today known only as breweriana and about the people involved.

How they survived Prohibition honestly is interesting, and a tale from Mr. Millard goes like this: "A saloon in Yerington put two gallons of alcohol into a barrel of (near) beer. A customer drank two glasses of the spiked beer — going out the door he fell flat on his face. Since they forgot to shake the barrel he received mostly alcohol."

As the author as president, general manager, brewmaster, and in nearly every other capacity since his first job there as a youth, he has lots to tell. Another good one is what happened to the 5¢ beer and the free lunch that came with it. In World War II the government rationed nearly everything but the rationing of bottle caps provided an interesting challenge. Their response was to invent a device to reform old ones that had been discarded. Thus, caps were collected outdoors for hundreds of miles around, reformed, and then fitted with new cork liners.

Along with such ingenuity came a great reputation, and a market developed, not only in Nevada and in nearby California, but also in Alaska. "Tahoe Beer was sent from Reno to a wholesaler in Seattle who in turn sent some of it to Alaska . . . Over 135,000 tickets were sold betting on the month, day, hour, and minute the ice break would occur on the river (near Fairbanks)".

There are more stories, lots more stories — they never charged a deposit for their barrels — and lots of fine illustrations. As Willie Nelson sings, "Another piece of America's gone." Support your local brewery.

Over the months I've written of major label changes, the finding of new cans, and of course all those shelf fillers; like color shifts, 6 cities vs 8 cities, vertical UPCs vs horizontal UPCs. After a while it dwells on your mind.

I knew I was in deep trouble when I started noticing changes in Pork 'N Bean cans. You know, there must be untold ways to arrange beans in a thick sumptuous sauce. Things were so bad that I once found myself in the generic section of the local supermarket, cataloging tissue paper, sugar, dog food, & potato chips by brewery.

The tissue paper could be had plain by Picketts, or with stars & stripes by Falstaff — or is that General? The dog food was available plain by Pittsburgh? Or with a blue band by Pearl, or General? The last thing I remember was my very understanding wife leading me to the car. She said I was mumbling something about shelf space.

I still cry out in my sleep some, but I've been able to cope with "shelf space mania" pretty good. I do real well until I hear the word Generic. That's when I get nauseous, feel a sharp pain near my billfold, and have visions of owning a larger home. I suppose I'll never fully recover.

BLUE 'N GOLD (sim. BCU 19/21) George Powell #23273 reports that he has a flat top that is identical to the cone. Hmmm, maybe someday we will solve the "North Bay of Santa Rosa" mystery.

BUDWEISER (AB 17) Ron Greenblatt #1875 wonders why "bud nuts" haven't said something about these ones — #1 says "New All Aluminum Can." #2 says "ALL Aluminum Can." A-B did this to Busch, why not Bud? Makes sense ... but "bud nuts?"

HARVARD (BCU 80/2 & 3, Bible 1271 & 1272) Brent Davis #18426 has found another one of those two in one cans. He found some BCU 80/3, Bible 1272 cans that are painted over a BCU 80/2, Bible

1271 labels. This would indicate to me that the "Green Label" can was filled before the "Foam Fresh" can. The Bible info disputes this?

LONE STAR (LS 20, current) This can was pictured in the last issue of *News Report*. I found this by a pure accident. Both cans have the same label, except the ingredient statement around the top is in gold on #1, and red on #2. Silly isn't it? Why change colors? No one reads about the stuff it's made from anyway. Do they?

PATHMARK (BCU 104/16, Bible 2179, HBU 4) From J.A. Kerr #10964 this brand by two different brewers. #1 by Hofbrau Brewing Co., Allentown, Pa. 18102. #2 by Forrest Brewing Co.; New York, N.Y., Orange, N.J., & New Bedford, Mass. Otherwise the same, although there is a slight difference in positioning of the contents info.

RED, WHITE & BLUE (current) I had noticed that Pabst was doing a little city juggling on their cans. While trying to make up my mind if it was newsworthy or not, I discovered something else: The little red circle logo on can #1 says "Pabst R Breweries." On can #2 it says "Pabst Brewing Co., Since 1844." Cans are the same design with only small differences in print size, where they list brewery locations.

SCHAEFER is now out in a tall slender 12 oz. can. A Strohs influence I'm sure. The can is identical to the current can, with a small exception. The ingredient statement at top of the can has the word "milled" deleted. I guess they don't mill their corn anymore.

SCHLITZ (BCU 148/24) Two old 16 oz. flats that are dated the same and found together near a trout stream. Can #1 (as shown) has brewery info, contents, & date in two lines around bottom of can. Can #2 has the same info, but with one line on each side of the seam. Both have "half quart" at the top and are dated 1954.

SCHMIDTS LIGHT BEER (current) For those of you who have lots

of shelf space. This brand is found with carbohydrates at 2.0 gm or 2.8 gm.

UINTA (BCU 124/21) From the "CAPE CODER" by Ralph Collins, a fine chapter newsletter. Can #1 is same as in BCU — "Old Style Lager," near seam it says "distributed by Becker ..." Can #2 says "Old Type Lager." The statement near seam is not present.

"Super Eyeball" for Steve Reed #21795. He would like to know about Bible #30 & 31. How come it says "contents one full pint 16 fluid ozs" at the top of #30, but "contents 12 fluid ounces" on its reverse, #31?

Anyone with eyes like that should be able to shoot a hole the size of a baseball, in a hummingbird at 200 yards.

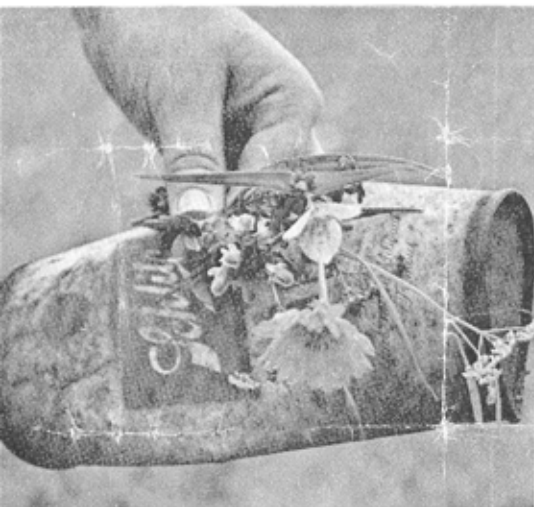
Potpourri east
